Rules of Engagement

- Order of speakers randomly selected
- No disruption of speakers
- No harassment or disrespect will be tolerated (zero tolerance policy)

- District Councilors may address comments in real time or may follow up with community member at a later time

Be as specific as possible.	<p>Based on 2024 crime data, Robberies remain a priority in the 019th District. Overall, during 2024, 370 Robberies, armed and strong-arm, have been reported compared to 362 in 2023, which is a 2.2% increase. The 20 sector was most affected by robberies in 2024. Beats 1925 had the most reported with 38, followed by 1924 with 37, 1923 with 36, 1922 with 22, and 1921 with 14. Other beats with significant reported robberies were 1914, with 38, and 1934, with 28 incidents reported. Most incidents occurred on the first watch with 164, followed by the third watch with 139, and the second watch with 67. We have seen an increase in incidents happening on the third and second watch this year. The increase in robberies also connects to the "Spree" patterns happening across the city. These robberies occur near major thoroughfares and public transportation hubs, allowing the offenders to leave the area quickly. Additionally, the 019th District is home to many businesses that many residents and tourists frequent. The many restaurants, bars, and venues lend to heavy pedestrian traffic. Due to the vibrant entertainment scene of the 19th District, many transportation options, and the potential for unsuspecting and sometimes inebriated victims, it can be a "hot spot" for robbery offenders.</p>

- **Accountability**




