# Chicago Police Department Accountability Structure

## COPA INVESTIGATES ALLEGATIONS OF:

- Bias-based verbal abuse
- Coercion
- Death or serious bodily injury in custody
- Domestic violence
- Excessive force
- Improper search and seizure
- Firearm discharge
- Sexual misconduct
- Taser discharge that results in death or serious bodily injury
- Pattern or practices of misconduct
- Unlawful denial or access to counse

# CPD'S BUREAU OF INTERNAL AFFAIRS INVESTIGATES:

All other complaints of police misconduct, including but not limited to:

- Criminal misconduct
- Operational violations
- Theft of money or property
- Planting of drugs
- Substance abuse
- Residency violations
- Medical roll abuse

## Consent Decree Requires Mediation

#### E. Community Mediation of Complaints

- 510. Mediation can be a valuable tool for expediting the resolution of complaints, building trust between community members and police, and fostering mutual respect.
- 511. In order to develop a new mediation policy governing the resolution of disciplinary actions by the agreement of the CPD member and non-CPD member complainant, the City will solicit public input, through community engagement efforts, regarding the methods by which mediation will most effectively build trust between community members and police and foster mutual respect.
- 512. The City will ensure that within 365 days of the Effective Date, COPA and BIA have developed parallel policies regarding the mediation of misconduct complaints by non-CPD members. The policies will govern mediation of misconduct complaints involving non-CPD member complainants. The policies will specify, at a minimum, (a) the criteria for determining incidents eligible for resolution through mediation; (b) the goals of mediation, including efficiency, transparency, procedural justice, restorative justice, and strengthening public trust; (c) the steps in the mediation process; and (d) methods of communication with complainants

regarding the mediation process and the opportunity to participate. Items (a) through (d) above will be consistent between the CPD and COPA mediation policies.

## How Community-Police Mediation Works


Voluntary for both parties



### **Organizational Profile**

## WFAS Update

At the Consent Decree hearing, the **Attorney General's Office** echoed a view shared by many District Council Members:

- The City increase increase transparency around the workforce allocation study.
- Progress updates need to be shared more frequently.
- The City promised multiple community engagement opportunities, but only one has occurred so far (in May).

# City Budget

## City Budget Proposal - Key Public Safety Updates

### Creates a Community Safety Fund

- Revenue from a revived head tax would fund programs such as:
  - Violence Prevention
  - Youth Employment / Diversion Programs
  - Expand Recreational and Community Services
  - First Responder Wellness
- Projected to raise \$100 million in annual revenue

## City Budget Proposal - Key Public Safety Updates

### **Police Overtime Spending Capped**

- Increased the budget for police overtime from \$100 million to \$200 million
- This year CPD exceeded this in the first 6 months
- City Council approval needed if the cap is to be exceeded

## City Budget Proposal - Key CARE Updates

### **Crisis Assistance Response and Engagement Team (CARE)**

- Funding will continue into 2026 WIN!!
- Funding will be in the corporate budget WIN!!
- CARE <u>will not</u> be expanded MORE WORK NEEDED
- Proposed tax on social media companies WIN!!
  - Estimated to create around \$31 million in revenue
  - Earmarked for free mental health clinics throughout Chicago and the expansion of mental health crisis response teams



### Public Comment - Rules & Follow Up

#### **Rules of Engagement**

- 2 min/speaker = ~10 speakers (typically 20 minutes total)
- Request to make public comment must be submitted within 30-minutes of start of meeting
- Order of speakers randomly selected
- No disruption of speakers
- No harassment or disrespect will be tolerated (zero tolerance policy)

#### **Follow Up**

- District Councilors and staff will take official minutes of public comments made
- District Councilors may address comments in real time or may follow up with community member at a later time
