Methodology

The data in this report came directly from District Council public monthly meetings held in April 2026. These meetings serve as a primary forum for community members to raise and address concerns about policing and public safety. At the recommendation of CCPSA staff, District Councils adjusted their agendas to include open, forum-style conversations focused on identifying trends and concerns in each district, as well as providing opportunities for councils to make recommendations to the Commission and vote on resolutions.

After each meeting, District Councils were provided with a draft summary of their respective monthly report for review and were invited to submit edits or additions to ensure accuracy and completeness. For District Councils that cancelled their April meeting, CCPSA staff conducted outreach to gather trends and concerns heard from constituents during the month, councilor reports on community engagements, and any recommendations for the Commission. This process fulfills the District Council responsibility outlined in §2-80-070(e)(3), which calls for District Councils to delegate members to attend quarterly meetings with representatives from each District Council to identify trends and concerns. By systematically collecting and organizing this information, the report will support the planning team responsible for these quarterly meetings, ensuring that conversations about trends and concerns reflect citywide patterns and priorities.

These steps also support the ordinance's requirement that District Councils report findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Commission (§2-80-070(e)(8)). The purpose of this process is to accomplish the responsibilities outlined in the Empowering Communities for Public Safety Ordinance and to ensure that community voices inform public safety policy and accountability efforts. The information gathered will be used to identify opportunities for collaboration among District Councils, inform and create new special projects, and encourage greater engagement with the Commission.

Beginning with this edition, the monthly report includes a new Working Group Updates section. District Council working groups are collaborative bodies made up of District Councilors who collaborate around a shared public safety issue or campaign. Working groups allow District Councilors to pool their expertise, coordinate advocacy efforts, and engage directly with city departments, oversight agencies, and community partners on specific priorities. The updates included in this section reflect the current status of each working group's purpose, membership, and recent activity, and are intended to provide transparency into the work being done between monthly meetings.

District Councils act as the eyes and ears of their communities at a hyper-local level, providing critical insight that helps shape CCPSA's accountability efforts and citywide strategies. The public input gathered at each meeting is not only valuable, it is essential to ensuring that policies and initiatives reflect the lived experiences of residents. This report is part of that commitment to transparency and collaboration.

PARKING ALTERNATIVE RESPONSE TEAM (PART)

Update: The group is actively engaging all relevant stakeholders to refine the proposed ordinance and is developing a policy brief on relevant data systems to strengthen the proposal.

CARE — MENTAL HEALTH ALTERNATIVE RESPONSE

QUARTERLY & ANNUAL MEETINGS

Purpose: This working group fulfills the ordinance obligation to identify and discuss citywide public safety trends on a quarterly basis and to propose Commission priorities on an annual basis.

Update: The next Quarterly Meeting is scheduled for June 27 on the Southeast Side. During that meeting, District Councilors who have submitted draft priority proposals will present their ideas for feedback from the broader group. The priority proposal submission process is currently open through May 25, and District Councilors are encouraged to submit proposals. Topics under

consideration include Consent Decree accountability, District Council input in commander selection, CPD policies for neurodivergent individuals, victim services, CARE program policies, workforce allocation, and District Strategic Plans.

COPA MEDIATION PROGRAM

Update: Training for community mediators has begun. District Councilors have expressed interest in observing the trainings.

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE COMMUNITY COURTS (RJCC)

Update: The group is focused on building education and awareness among District Councilors and community members to strengthen advocacy for broader court utilization. Efforts are underway to engage court leadership and to have RJCC coordinators present at District Council meetings across the city.

COMMUNITY JUSTICE ALLIANCE

Purpose: This is a new working group focused on bringing a community mediation pilot to the 15th District that would allow neighbors to intervene and de-escalate conflicts before they require a 911 response.

COMMUNITY POLICING

Purpose: This is a new working group established to collaborate with CPD and CCPSA Commissioners on the development and implementation of a community policing model that strengthens coordination between CPD and the Commission. The group aims to advance public safety and community trust by improving community policing practices across eight recommendation areas: officer training, geographic integrity, problem-solving approaches, victim services, community engagement, public awareness, and accountability.

Update: The group is working to obtain clarity from CPD on implementation plans and timelines. The first in-person meeting with CPD is scheduled for June 12.

WORKFORCE ALLOCATION

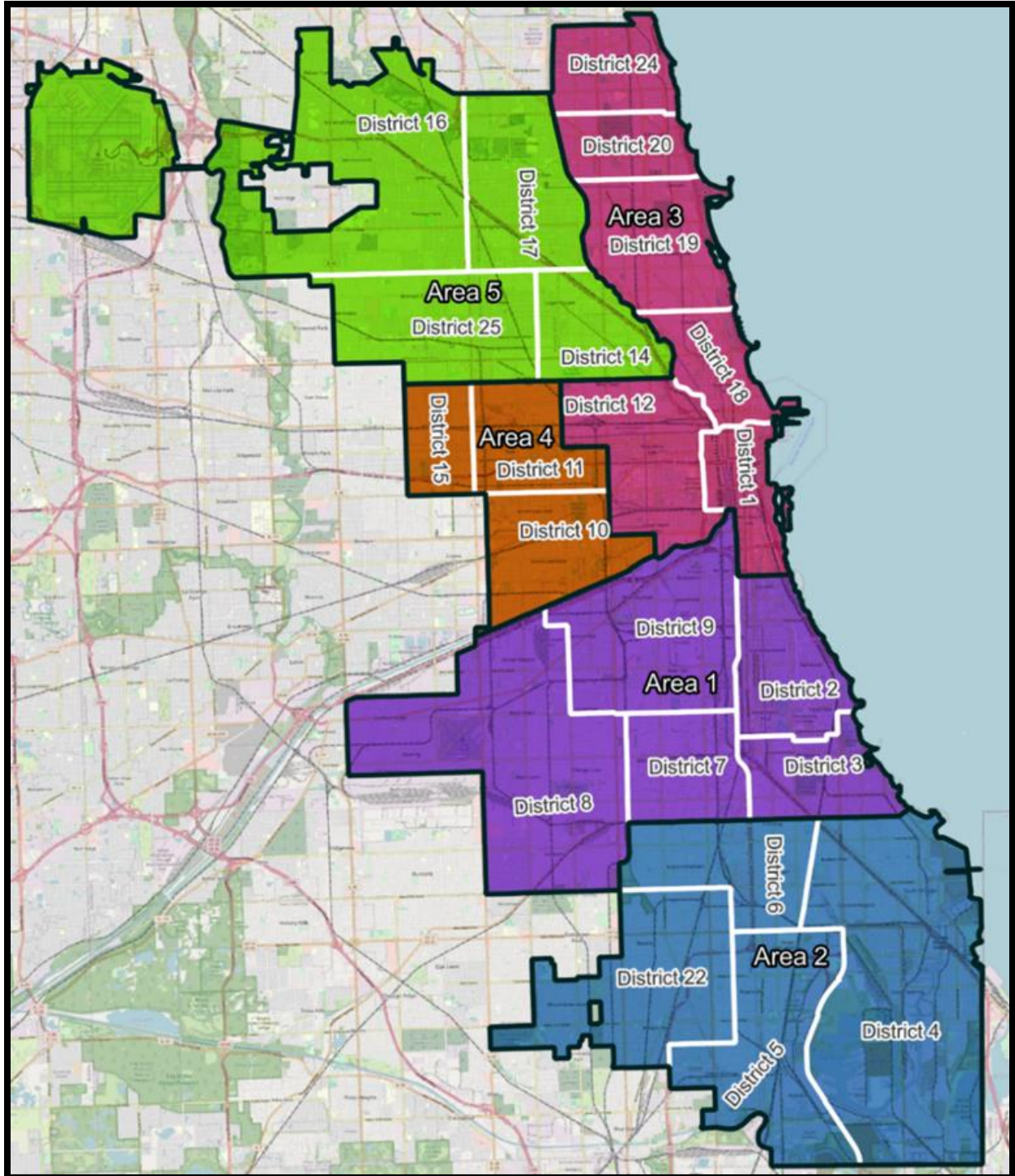
Purpose: This working group works to improve the effectiveness of CPD's District Strategic Plans by providing recommendations aligned with community needs.

- d. Criminal damage: multiple instances of car windows smashed without theft intent
- e. Street takeovers & loud vehicles: dedicated car caravan team working to disrupt activity; CPD limited by pursuit policy once vehicles run red lights; City Council authorized vehicle impoundment for offenders; recent incident at 22nd and Michigan
- f. Shoplifting: significant reduction achieved; stores now cooperating with CPD by signing complaints and working with loss prevention; Cook County State's Attorney prosecuting at felony level; Cook County Sheriff's Office previously assisted with shoplifting enforcement in the district
- g. Postal theft & package theft: mailboxes broken into; master key reported stolen in the area near Soldier Field; CPD coordinating with postal inspectors and Bureau of Detectives; postal inspectors conducting roll call training with CPD officers; community encouraged to coordinate with neighbors for package pickup
- h. Cook County Sheriff's Office: operates as a partner agency in the district; responds to assist CPD on 911 calls but does not independently respond; conducted targeted missions in the South Loop
- i. 911 response times: First District consistently among top three districts citywide for calls for service volume; community encouraged to clearly articulate urgency, whether incident is in progress, and any signs of mental health concerns when calling 911 to ensure appropriate prioritization
- j. Manpower: district receives additional probationary officers on 90-day rotation cycles; Critical Incident Response Team under Commander Ackerman supplements the district for large events and targeted missions

- i. **Traffic Safety**
 - a. Multiple reports of drivers routinely running red lights, making illegal turns, and engaging in unsafe behavior near major intersections including Belmont/Ashland near Whole Foods
 - b. Community members suggested installation of red-light cameras
- ii. **Airbag Theft**
 - a. Spike in airbag thefts targeting Honda Civics in the 19th District
 - b. District particularly vulnerable due to high street-parking density and proximity to expressways
 - c. CPD advising use of steering wheel locks and alarms

 - a. Individuals soliciting donations via tap-to-pay terminals and later increasing charges without authorization

 - a. Certain districts have extremely low proactive time (as low as 9%), demonstrating uneven resource distribution across the city
 - b. 19th District currently averages 31% proactive time, below CPD's target of 40%
 - c. Top 911 call categories include disturbances, wellbeing checks, and parking — highlighting areas where civilian response may be appropriate

Councilor Reports

- i. **Workforce Allocation Study (WAS) — Councilor Schaffer**
 - a. Extensive findings presented from the newly released 700+ page study
 - b. CPD's civilianization rate is 8% compared to 24–31% in peer cities
 - c. Recommendation to civilianize 604 positions and add a net of 57 sworn officers under Model B to improve workload distribution and supervisory ratios
 - d. Proposal to move from beat-based to sector-based deployment and meet the 40% proactive time goal
 - e. Councilors highlighted implementation challenges, multi-year timelines, and need to align deployment with community policing goals
- ii. **PART (Parking Alternative Response Team) Initiative — Councilor Schaffer**
 - a. Ongoing work to shift 8–10% of 911 calls related to parking violations from CPD to the Department of Finance

 - a. Ongoing advocacy for expanded civilian mental health response and citywide 24/7 CARE operations

- vi. **De-escalation Workshop for Small Businesses**
 - a. Councilors attended and supported a de-escalation workshop for small businesses emphasizing confidence-building, nonviolent conflict resolution, and last-resort self-defense; over 30 attendees
- vii. **Firearm Industry Responsibility Act (RIFL Act)**
 - a. May 8 Day of Action in Springfield announced in support of the RIFL Act; community encouraged to participate

Top Trends & Concerns Discussed in Monthly Meeting

i. CARE Team Funding & Mental Health Crisis Response

- a. CARE team operates out of CDPH as an alternative first response to mental health crises; currently deployed alongside police officers with a goal of eventually operating independently like fire/EMS
- b. Currently funded through end of budget year via ARPA funds; limited to Monday–Friday, 10AM–4PM with no evening or weekend coverage
- c. No significant increases in staff or vehicles since citywide expansion; estimated \$3 million needed to run a pilot or expand to 24/7 operations
- d. Teams consist of trained social workers and EMTs; CPD officers also have CIT (Crisis Intervention Training) but goal is for specialists to handle most calls unless violence is present
- e. Calls routed through 911/OEMC dispatch; advocates note crises frequently occur outside current operational hours
- f. Idaho's elimination of a similar community-based mental health program and subsequent negative outcomes cited as cautionary example supporting sustained funding

ii. Youth & Gang Violence

- a. Cases transitioning from mostly gang-related to an increase in domestic and mental health-related shootings
- b. Recent high-profile shooting in the district; ongoing concerns about gun violence near Howard Street and Wilson Avenue
- c. CP4P program has achieved five-year peace agreement between historically rival Uptown groups; zero shootings between groups in five years

iii. Immigration Enforcement & CPD Accountability

- a. Community member raised concern about inadequate questioning of Superintendent Snelling at recent CCPSA meeting regarding CPD collaboration with ICE in potential violation of Chicago's Welcoming City Ordinance
- b. Superintendent declined to appear with a panel; commissioners provided minimal substantive follow-up; community video evidence of June 4, 2025 incident not credibly addressed

Councilor Reports

i. CARE Team Expansion

- a. Petition drive underway seeking 150 signatures per district councilor for sustained CARE team funding; all members asked to sign and collect signatures
- b. Proposal to reallocate some CPD funding to cover CARE expansion, given potential reductions in police responses to non-criminal mental health calls

- c. Data requested on CARE team outcomes including total calls, repeat crises, referrals to services, and number of police responses avoided; Anna (absent) to provide metrics at next meeting
 - d. Haven on Lincoln transitional facility (40th ward) expected to open end of May/early June; will partner with Swedish Hospital to provide long-term mental health and substance abuse services for unhoused individuals
- ii. **CP4P Violence Prevention Program — Guest Presenter Darrell Daker**
 - a. Program covers Uptown, Rogers Park, Edgewater, and Near North; services include victim advocacy at shooting scenes, case management, financial empowerment classes, and workforce development
 - b. Five-year peace agreement between Uptown gang groups has produced zero shootings among those groups; Senn High School shooting situation fully resolved — five families assisted into first-time homeownership with zero repeat incidents
 - c. Improved collaboration with CPD: commanders now directly request outreach worker presence at scenes; shift from gang-related to domestic and mental health-related shootings noted as emerging trend
 - d. Exploring partnerships with advocacy groups serving newly arrived immigrant communities experiencing violence upticks; push for sustainable city/state funding ongoing
- iii. **Immigration, Policing Oversight & CCPSA Accountability**
 - a. April 2 special meeting with Superintendent Snelling: councilors submitted extensive questions on CPD/ICE coordination and Welcoming City Ordinance compliance; Superintendent declined to appear with panelists and was sole respondent
 - b. 30-minute meeting fell far short of expectations: Superintendent mostly spoke without substantive challenge from commissioners; key questions including June 4, 2025 video evidence not credibly addressed
 - c. District Councilors will organize their own independent panel and public meeting with subject-matter experts; if Superintendent declines to attend, his absence will be explicitly noted and publicized
 - d. Alderman Vasquez (Chair, Committee on Immigrant and Refugee Rights) committed to hosting independent hearings with public visibility and media coverage
- iv. **CCPSA Commissioner Appointments**
 - a. Angelique Guzman & Anjanette Young discussed as commissioner candidates
 - b. Pending mayoral approval

Recommendations for the Commission, Resolutions, and other Proposed Actions

- i. **Advocate for sustained and expanded CARE team funding, including 24/7 operations and additional staff and vehicles beyond current citywide levels**
- ii. **Secure sustainable city and state funding for the CP4P violence prevention program and support staff expansion to a minimum of 30 team members for full north side coverage**
- iii. **Organize an independent DC 020 community panel on CPD/ICE coordination and Welcoming City Ordinance compliance; publicize widely, note any absence of Superintendent Snelling, and coordinate with Alderman Vasquez's committee hearings**
- iv. **Support CP4P partnership expansion to serve newly arrived immigrant communities experiencing violence upticks in the 20th district**

Top Trends & Concerns Discussed in Monthly Meeting

i. Shootings & Neighborhood Violence

- Recent shooting discussed with district commander; a separate shooting occurred on a Wednesday near a councilor's residence
- Recognition that spring months typically bring increased incidents
- Ongoing inter-group tensions in the district; peace conversations underway but not all affected parties are ready
- Emphasis on the need for healing, restoration, and repair before broader reconciliation events
- Shooting in West Ridge (daytime/early evening on a Wednesday); councilors noted understanding of neighborhood dynamics but acknowledged risk of escalation
- Reports of active disputes involving known groups including "the Kings" and "SGDs"
- Emerging presence of newer groups, per district commander

ii. Property Crime

- Significant increase in catalytic converter thefts across Rogers Park; thefts occurring in under 2 minutes; residents advised to etch VIN numbers on converters and use physical locks; aldermanic spray-painting deterrent initiatives referenced
- Tire thefts also reported across Rogers Park as a separate emerging trend

iii. Homelessness, Mental Health & Transit

- Unhoused persons sleeping on CTA trains being ticketed with no resources provided; concern over lack of clarity around CPD protocol
- Paulina & Estes identified as a safety hotspot by a resident: past assault, recent homicide at the northeast corner; request made to designate the area as a watch zone
- Rising cost of living (\$60 for five grocery items cited) contributing to context of "crimes of need"; strong community opposition to further criminalization of poverty

iv. Youth Safety & Use of Public Space

- Shortage of summer jobs for teens in Rogers Park and West Ridge; lack of third spaces contributing to teens congregating in parks, leading to adults calling police on groups of 3–4 teens
- Adults calling police on teens in parks described as counterproductive; emphasis on need for investment in teen-friendly programming and supervised spaces
- Teens in the Park (TP) program referenced as a model; calls for expansion

v. Police-Community Relations

- Divergence in community sentiment: some areas feel over-policed, others want more visible presence
- Broad preference for officers conducting foot beat walks rather than remaining stationary in patrol cars
- Concern about unoccupied police cruisers left with lights flashing near business districts (e.g., Devon Avenue) as a superficial deterrent

- d. Community engagement officers attempting youth outreach with mixed success; at least one high school in the district has declined CPD engagement programs

Councilor Reports

- i. **CCPSA Special Meeting — Councilor Arreola**
 - a. Attended the CCPSA special meeting with Superintendent Snelling; found it offensive and disappointing
 - b. CCPSA commissioners failed to recognize district councilors in the room despite their presence and contributions
 - c. Superintendent's responses largely amounted to "you don't understand the law"; questions about CPD's response to ICE activity and alleged collaboration with federal immigration agents were not substantively addressed
 - d. Lack of strong follow-up questioning from commissioners; overall meeting fell far short of community expectations
- ii. **CCPSA Nominating Committee — Councilor Pagán-Banks**
 - a. Approximately 22 district councilors participated in the nominating process; 6 names submitted to the commission, 3 initially seated
 - b. Mayor confirmed 2 appointments: Angelique Guzman (north side/youth representative) and Angenette Young (south side); third appointment still pending
 - c. Councilor self-nominated for an additional committee role but was not selected
 - d. Joined the Wellness and Care Committee; signed on to related initiatives
 - e. District to host upcoming UCS (United Community Safety) major conversations
- iii. **Community Engagement & Events — Councilor Jean-Joseph**
 - a. Beat meeting update: residents raised concern about abandoned cars near the Target on Peterson Avenue
 - b. Raised issue of unhoused persons being ticketed on CTA without resources; working with community engagement liaison on a one-pager of local resources for the Howard L stop area
 - c. Meeting with district commander rescheduled to April 16, 2026 (1:00–2:30 PM), open drop-in format
 - d. Glenwood Arts Festival: council voted to allocate \$1,545 (from \$5,000 budget) for a table, tent, and chairs; discussion of additional promotional materials; outreach coordination planned with CP4P, DC 020, and youth organizer Serena
 - e. Just Harvest Bird Carnival (May 16): council table participation confirmed using existing supplies; north side district councilors invited to march together to the festival
 - f. Upcoming 2026 meeting dates established: May 26, June 13, July 25, August 29, September 22, October 27, November 28 (Thanksgiving — to be revisited)
- iv. **Harm Reduction & Public Safety Innovation — Councilor Arreola**
 - a. A Just Harvest has initiated safe resting spaces at the Howard L station and is in conversation with Advocate Hospital about a potential mobile clinic
 - b. Proposed three-way partnership between Just Harvest, a restorative justice organization, and Advocate Hospital to provide harm reduction services, health care access, and restorative justice work at the Howard L station
 - c. Grant opportunity identified for innovative public safety interventions; letter of intent due soon; special meeting scheduled for April 15, 2026 at 6:00 PM to draft the letter
 - d. Referenced harm reduction organizations active in Rogers Park including Lighthouse, Chicago Recovery Alliance, Howard Area Community Center, and Family Guidance Center
 - e. Emphasis on employment and rehabilitative pathways for those transitioning out of street life or substance use; need for step-by-step pipeline from basic needs to job readiness

Recommendations for the Commission, Resolutions, and other Proposed Actions

- i. Designate Paulina & Estes as a community watch zone and increase awareness of safety conditions at that intersection**
- ii. Develop and distribute a one-pager of local resources for unhoused residents and those ticketed on CTA, particularly around the Howard L stop**
- iii. Advocate for expanded summer employment and supervised third spaces for teens in Rogers Park and West Ridge**
- iv. Support the proposed harm reduction and restorative justice partnership at the Howard L station and advance the public safety innovation grant application**
- v. Urge CCPSA commissioners to formally recognize district councilors at public meetings and engage more substantively with community-submitted questions**

i. Mental Health Crisis Response & CARE Program Access a. CARE program currently limited to Monday–Friday, 10:30 AM–4:00 PM with no evening, weekend, or citywide coverage; crises occur well outside these hours b. Barriers to accessing CARE include unclear dispatcher protocol, reliance on specific keywords, and lack of transparency in training and scripts; community members and councilors expressed difficulty knowing how to request CARE during a crisis call c. Cost identified as the primary barrier to accessing mental health services citywide, outweighing cultural stigma d. Only 2 "living room" drop-in mental health centers available on Chicago's west side; 12 public mental health centers closed in the past decade with only 3 reopened so far	
Councilor Reports	
i. Treatment Not Trauma & CARE Program Expansion a. Treatment Not Trauma initiative aims to increase access to mental health resources outside of police involvement, reopen public mental health centers, and develop "living room" drop-in centers offering low-barrier mental health services in a home-like atmosphere b. Survey results show cost as the primary barrier to accessing mental health services citywide, outweighing cultural stigma c. CARE program currently operates Monday–Friday, 10:30 AM–4:00 PM only; dispatched through 911 call center with no self-dispatch option; reliant on dispatcher's decision tree and use of specific keywords d. Current barriers to requesting CARE include unclear dispatcher protocol and lack of transparency in training and scripts; councilors and staff expressed difficulty understanding how to directly request CARE during a crisis call e. Community email for CARE referrals and follow-up: careprogram@6ofchicago.org f. Geographic coverage determined by areas of perceived high need at program launch; not always aligned with areas of highest need today g. Desire expressed for direct CARE access through 988 and 311 in addition to OEMC h. Importance of community-based staff on response teams for greater cultural competency i. "Chicken and egg" problem noted: more calls needed to prove CARE's value, but limited capacity restricts service hours and coverage j. Only approximately 20 "living room" model drop-in centers statewide in Illinois; just 2 on Chicago's west side; acknowledged as crucial but underfunded k. Arguments made for re-establishing city-run mental health services over nonprofit models, citing sustainability, accountability, better job security and unionization potential for workers, and universal access regardless of geography or affiliation	

ii. Funding & Expansion Advocacy

- a. Progressive revenue proposals discussed including taxes on high-income individuals and corporations, proportional reallocation of CPD funds to CARE and mental health services, and a "Smart Tax" on social media companies with projected future revenue dedicated to mental health (delayed due to anticipated legal challenges)
- b. Systematic expansion needed for CARE to become 24/7 and citywide
- c. Suggestion for district councilors to facilitate inter-jurisdictional connection and knowledge sharing with cities that have successfully expanded similar programs

- iv. Advocate for transparent public communication of CARE dispatch protocols and eligibility criteria**
- v. Support progressive revenue strategies to fund sustained mental health infrastructure, including reallocation of CPD funds and the Smart Tax on social media companies**
