Methodology

The data in this report came directly from District Council public monthly meetings held in February 2026. These meetings serve as a primary forum for community members to raise and address concerns about policing and public safety. At the recommendation of CCPSA staff, District Councils adjusted their agendas to include open, forum-style conversations focused on identifying trends and concerns in each district, as well as providing opportunities for councils to make recommendations to the Commission and vote on resolutions.

To provide additional context for the trends and concerns raised at each meeting, this report includes Chicago Police Department CompStat data at both the citywide and district levels. For each District Council, the CompStat report selected is the one that best captures the 28-day crime period most closely preceding their monthly meeting date. This approach ensures that the statistical data presented reflects the public safety landscape that community members and councilors were responding to at the time of their meeting, rather than a fixed reporting window that may not align with when each district gathered.

After each meeting, District Councils were provided with a draft summary of their respective monthly report for review and were invited to submit edits or additions to ensure accuracy and completeness. For District Councils that cancelled their February meeting, CCPSA staff conducted outreach to gather trends and concerns heard from constituents during the month, councilor reports on community engagements, and any recommendations for the Commission. This process fulfills the District Council responsibility outlined in §2-80-070(e)(3), which calls for District Councils to delegate members to attend quarterly meetings with representatives from each District Council to identify trends and concerns. By systematically collecting and organizing this information, the report will support the planning team responsible for these quarterly meetings, ensuring that conversations about trends and concerns reflect citywide patterns and priorities.

These steps also support the ordinance's requirement that District Councils report findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Commission (§2-80-070(e)(8)). The purpose of this process is to accomplish the responsibilities outlined in the Empowering Communities for Public Safety Ordinance and to ensure that community voices inform public safety policy and accountability efforts. The information gathered will be used to identify opportunities for collaboration among District Councils, inform and create new special projects, and encourage greater engagement with the Commission.

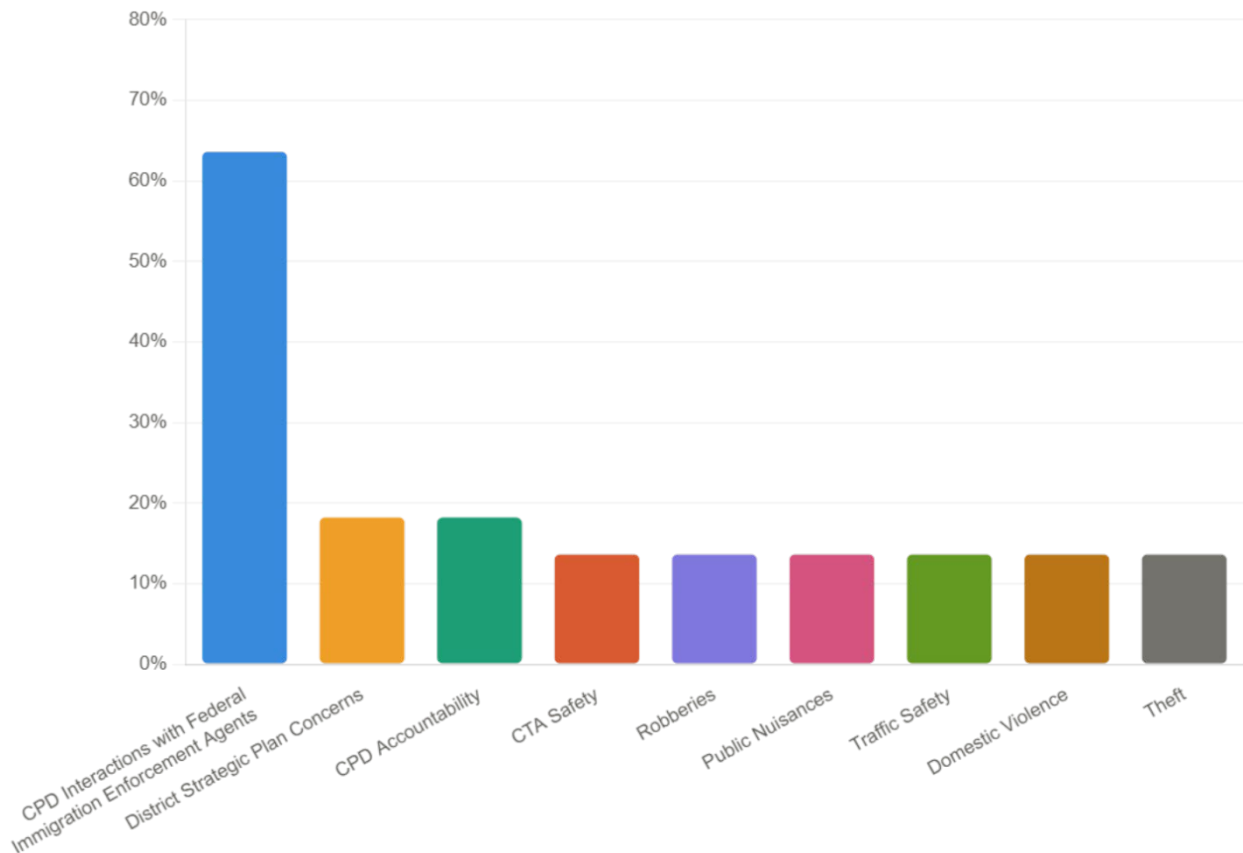

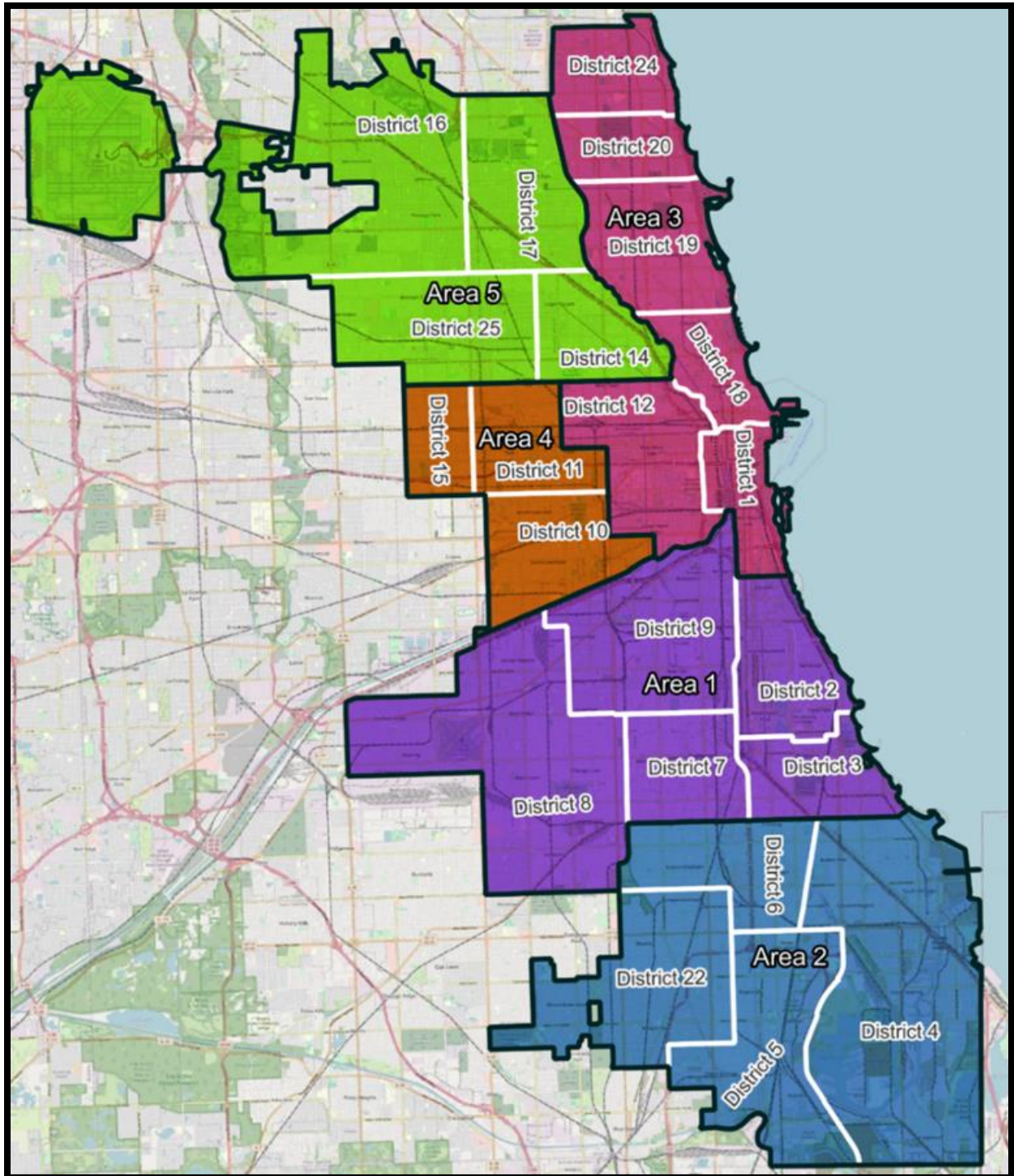

RESOLUTION TO CENSURE 6TH DISTRICT COUNCILOR DAVID BOYKIN

February 23, 2026

WHEREAS, the 6th District Council is an elected public body charged with representing the residents of the 6th Police District and conducting its business through regular and special meetings, public engagement, and collaboration among its duly elected members; and

WHEREAS, elected District Councilors have a duty to attend meetings, participate in Council deliberations, respond to official communications, and otherwise carry out the responsibilities of their office on behalf of the residents they serve; and

WHEREAS, since April 2025, 6th District Councilor David Boykin has not attended any regular or special meetings of the 6th District Council; and

WHEREAS, during this same period, the Council is unaware of any participation by Councilor Boykin in community events, Council activities, or other work conducted on behalf of the 6th District Council; and

WHEREAS, with one exception, Councilor Boykin has not responded to emails, meeting notices, or other official correspondence from the Council between April 2025 and the end of January 2026, including a communication sent to him on December 5, 2025 calling for his resignation; and

WHEREAS, state law does not give the 6th District Council nor the residents of the 6th District the legal ability to force Councilor Boykin to resign; and

WHEREAS, Councilor Boykin's prolonged absence and lack of engagement have impaired the Council's ability to function at full capacity and to meet the expectations of the residents of the 6th District; and

WHEREAS, the duration and extent of these absences constitute an abandonment of the duties and responsibilities of the office of District Councilor;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 6th District Council hereby formally **censures Councilor David Boykin** for failure to fulfill the obligations of his elected office; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 6th District Council calls for Councilor David Boykin to resign from his position as a member of the Council immediately to enable the Mayor of Chicago to appoint another individual to fill that role consistent with Illinois law; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this censure shall be entered into the official records of the 6th District Council; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this action reflects the Council's commitment to accountability, transparency, and the faithful representation of the residents of the 6th District.

Protect Chicago from Fascism

A Resolution by the elected 14th District Council of Chicago, Illinois, demanding decisive action to protect our communities from egregious state violence and making our position clear that authoritarianism, white supremacy, and ethno-nationalism have no place in Chicago or the nation.

WHEREAS, the duly elected 14th District Councilors have a duty to the people and to the City of Chicago, Illinois, to bring community concerns to relevant government agencies and to uphold the safety and security of all residents while working to prevent unaccountable state violence¹; and,

WHEREAS, federal immigration agents are trampling fundamental rights^{2 3 4}, violating record numbers of court orders⁵, disregarding state and federal laws⁶ and the United States Constitution^{7 8 9} while perpetrating a pattern^{10 11} of excessive unjustifiable violence^{12 13 14 15 16 17 18} in service of their illegal kidnapping operations¹⁹ relying heavily on racial profiling²⁰; and,

WHEREAS, federal immigration agents have attacked residents with internationally banned chemical^{21 22}, incendiary and projectile weapons²³ in front of Funston Elementary School^{24 25} and Humboldt Health Hospital²⁶, abducted dozens of neighbors and terrorized^{27 28} thousands of community members all within the 14th District; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has killed 43 people²⁹ in the past year, the most since its creation³⁰, including the murder of Silverio González^{31 32 33} by Arian Moore³⁴ and another agent in Franklin Park and attempted murder of Marimar Martinez^{35 36 37} in Chicago, also the murder of Nenko Gantchev in a DHS concentration camp after being taken from Chicago, as well as the recent murders of Isaias Barboza by Border Patrol, Keith Porter by Brian Palacios, Renée Good³⁸ by Jonathan Ross^{39 40 41}, and Alex Pretti^{42 43} by Jesus Ochoa^{44 45} and Raymundo Gutierrez⁴⁶; and,

WHEREAS, agents carry out these abuses anonymously while hiding their identities, using masks and sunglasses without badges⁴⁷, operating with an assuming impunity⁴⁸, and when called to court have been repeatedly known to lie^{49 50 51 52}, obfuscate, and otherwise misrepresent the facts^{53 54} just as they have done when making repeated false police reports against citizens; and,

WHEREAS, local law enforcement and criminal justice institutions including the Chicago Police Department (CPD), Illinois state police, national guard, and the Cook County State's Attorney's

Office have all effectively colluded with, collaborated^{55 56 57}, and aided and abetted in these high crimes including murder and treason and have escalated tensions by violently arresting Chicagoans utilizing their first amendment rights to record officials in public and protest their government; and,

WHEREAS, residents of the 14th District and greater Chicago⁵⁸ have repeatedly registered^{59 60} their condemnation^{61 62} for the violent, racist, and life endangering actions of federal immigration agents^{63 64 65}, as well as what effectively amounts to collaboration^{66 67} by local law enforcement^{68 69 70 71}; and,

WHEREAS, there is no hope for reforming these fundamentally unconstitutional agencies as the most violent killers among them are not recent untrained recruits but veterans⁷², commanders, and weapons trainers themselves⁷³, and killings by police have broken new records every year⁷⁴ under the same failed 'reform' methods of increasing funding⁷⁵ for equipment and training;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 14th District Council of Chicago do hereby elevate the following demands:

1. **Abolish Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) immediately and completely.** All elected officials must take a clear public policy position to end ICE and CBP by repealing the unconstitutional Patriot Act and Homeland Security Act, disbanding DHS. Senators and Congresspersons must draft and co-sponsor national legislation that achieves this and pass it into law. Local politicians must draft and pass demand resolutions condemning these agencies and their egregious violence, kidnappings, and murders. All public officials must do everything within their power to resist federal immigration enforcement, protect all residents, and aid in securing the speedy and complete dissolution of DHS including ending all funding thereof.
2. **End and condemn local law enforcement's collaboration with DHS agents.** Expand the protections under the Welcoming City Ordinance⁷⁶ to explicitly exclude the types of collaboration that have been repeatedly documented including: blocking normal traffic or escorting agents' vehicles, forming barricades around agents' and their targets while policing and performing 'crowd control' against Chicagoans, and detaining, arresting and charging residents engaging in the protected first amendment activity of observing and recording agents. Transfer jurisdiction for investigating these types of misconduct from CPD's Bureau of Internal Affairs to the Civilian Office of Police Accountability.

3. **Conduct a comprehensive investigation and arrest, charge, disclose, and prosecute killer and criminal federal agents.** The Cook County State's Attorney's Office and Attorney General's Office along with all other relevant agencies must take every necessary action to obtain, preserve, and disclose to the public the names of all agents who have committed crimes in Illinois, along with the details of the incidents and then press charges against them swiftly and effectively. This investigation must include the murderers of Silverio González and the attempted murderers of Marimar Martinez. It must also include agents who lied about being attacked and filed false police reports with CPD as well as those who lied in court and on official reports and records. It must also include the agents, including Commander Bovino, who engaged in excessive force and illegal use of banned weapons, as well as those engaging in hate speech, hate crimes, racial profiling and violation of basic rights.

 - i. Illinois Domestic Violence Hotline contacts jumped to 59,704 in 2024—a 26% increase from 2023 and
 - ii. 140% increase from 2019.
 - iii. For Chicago: 18,830 hotline contacts in 2024 (17% increase vs. 2023, 78% vs. 2019).
 - iv. Legal advocacy requests rose 74% between 2019 and 2024.
- c. Reporting and Attrition:
 - i. Fewer than half of assault and battery crimes (often domestic) are reported; even fewer result in
 - ii. prosecution and conviction.
 - iii. Example: Of 1,000 sexual assaults, only 310 reported, with 25 resulting in criminal accountability.
- d. CPD/Community Service Gap:
 - i. By September 2025, CPD had taken 57,000 domestic disturbance calls, including:
 - 1. 17,000 domestic battery calls,
 - 2. 13,000 order of protection violations.
 - 3. Reports: 1,400 aggravated assaults, 1,900 aggravated batteries, 320 sexual assaults, 37 homicides
 - 4. attributed.
 - 5. Domestic violence: 26% of violent crimes in Chicago (U.S. avg. ~20%).
- e. Funding Concerns:
 - i. Much of 2026's gender-based violence service budget routed to CPD's Office of Crime Victim Services.
 - 1. That office has 31 of 55 specialist vacancies.
 - 2. Community organizations (trusted and long-standing) have seen state and federal cuts; now face waitlists and reduced capacity.
 - ii. The Network (domestic violence coalition) requested \$3.9M in city funds be shifted from CPD to community orgs, with currently unmet success.
- f. Financial Impact:

- i. Estimated cost of intimate partner violence, sexual assault, and stalking exceeds \$5.8B per year (2020 figures); majority in healthcare and mental health expenses.
- g. Advocacy:
 - i. Community-based orgs are key, trusted resources, more often contacted by survivors than CPD.
 - ii. Loss of funding is causing critical service reductions (now waitlists even for initial advocacy).
- h. Relevance to Council:
 - i. Encouraged the council to collaborate on budget advocacy and inclusion of domestic violence resource funding in broader safety conversations.
 - ii. Future town halls planned on CPD's budget; possibility to integrate domestic violence budget advocacy.
