Methodology

The data in this report came directly from District Council public monthly meetings held in January 2026. These meetings serve as a primary forum for community members to raise and address concerns about policing and public safety. At the recommendation of CCPSA staff, District Councils adjusted their agendas to include open, forum-style conversations focused on identifying trends and concerns in each district, as well as providing opportunities for councils to make recommendations to the Commission and vote on resolutions.

After each meeting, District Councils were provided with a draft summary of their respective monthly report for review and were invited to submit edits or additions to ensure accuracy and completeness. For District Councils that cancelled their January meeting, CCPSA staff conducted outreach to gather trends and concerns heard from constituents during the month, councilor reports on community engagements, and any recommendations for the Commission. This process fulfills the District Council responsibility outlined in §2-80-070(e)(3), which calls for District Councils to delegate members to attend quarterly meetings with representatives from each District Council to identify trends and concerns. By systematically collecting and organizing this information, the report will support the planning team responsible for these quarterly meetings, ensuring that conversations about trends and concerns reflect citywide patterns and priorities.

These steps also support the ordinance's requirement that District Councils report findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Commission (§2-80-070(e)(8)). The purpose of this process is to accomplish the responsibilities outlined in the Empowering Communities for Public Safety Ordinance and to ensure that community voices inform public safety policy and accountability efforts. The information gathered will be used to identify opportunities for collaboration among District Councils, inform and create new special projects, and encourage greater engagement with the Commission.

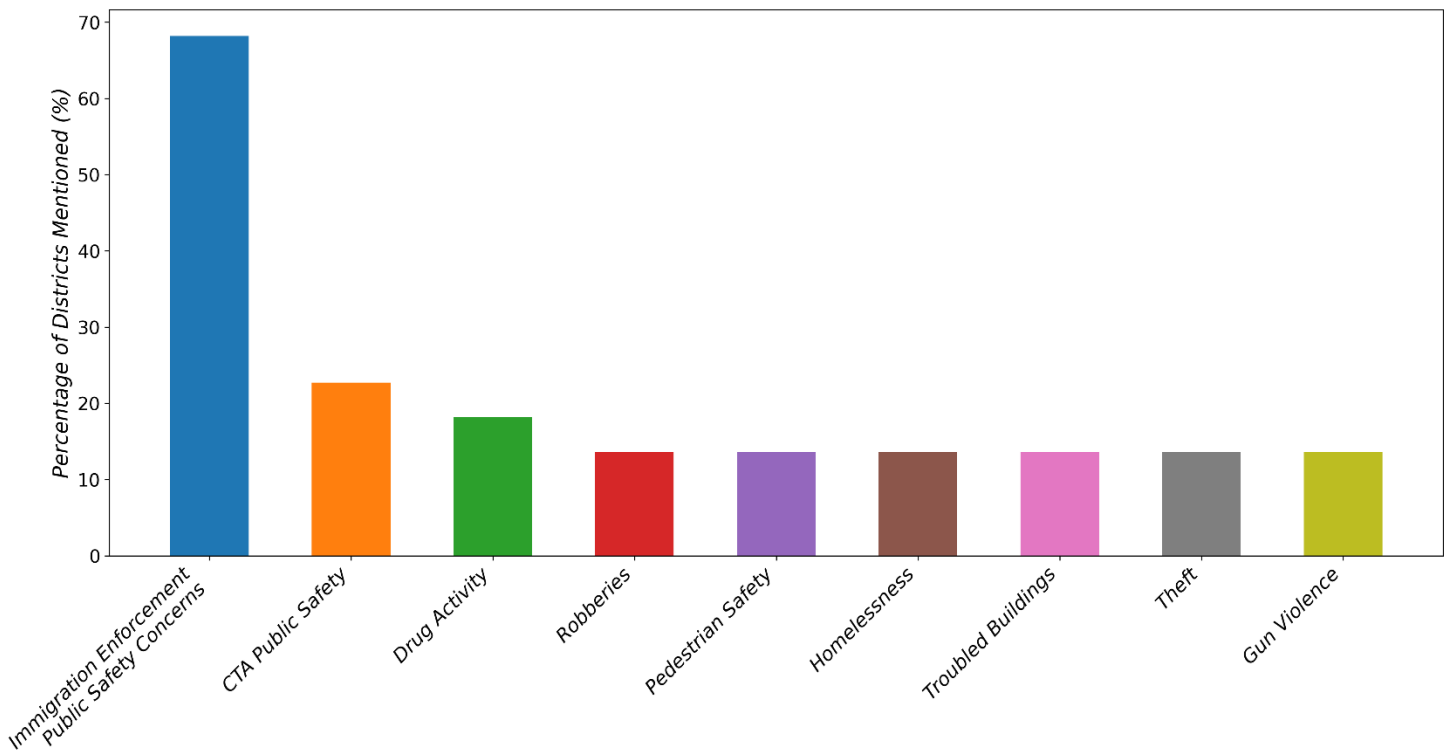

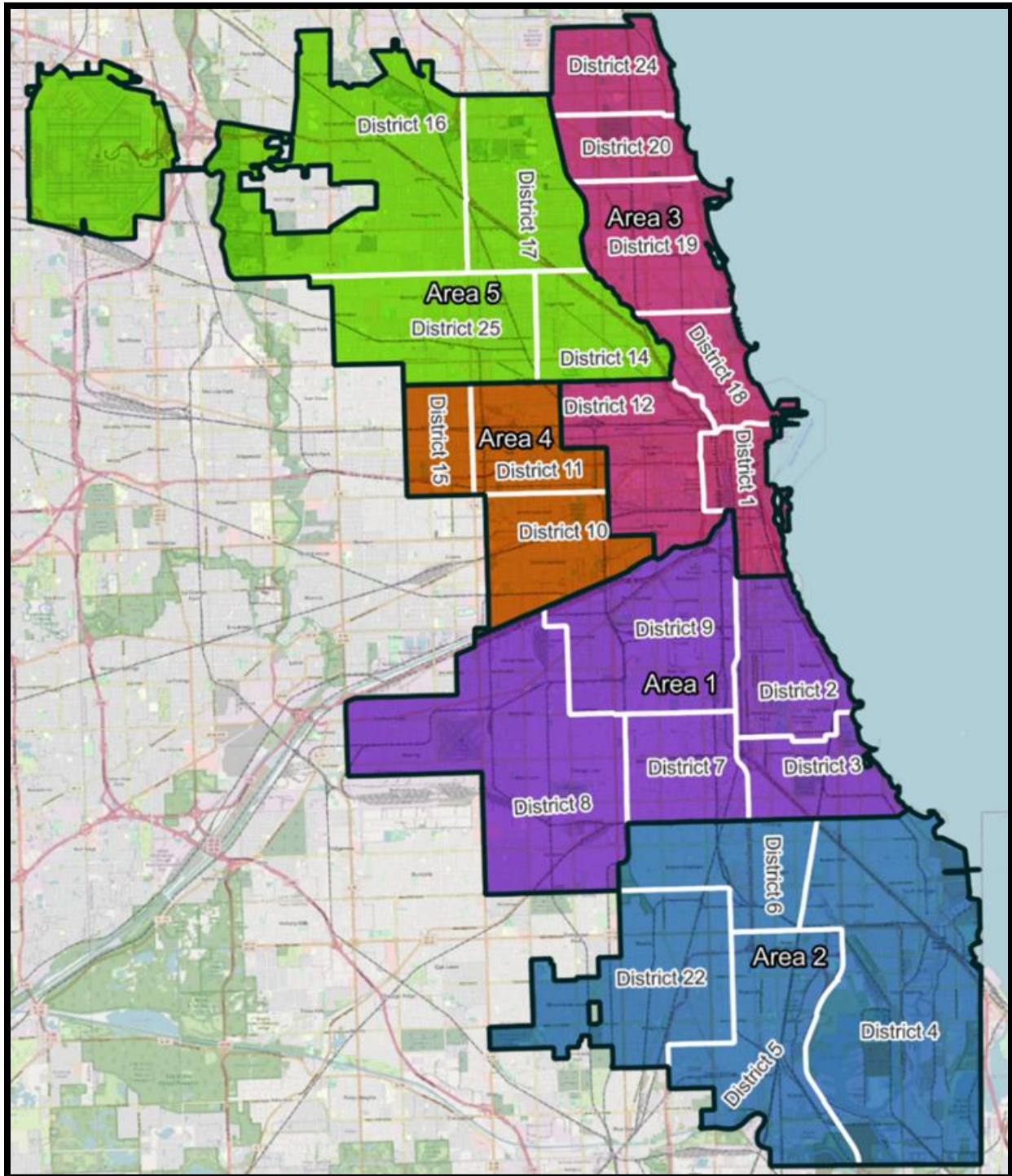

i. Recap of Commission Hearing on January 8, 2026 a. Attendance: Over 1,000 people (in-person and online). b. Noted as an emotional and powerful event, with stories from residents including those directly impacted by CPD and ICE c. Press Conference: Included OCAD, District Councilors d. Significance: Seen as a "true testament" to effective district council action and strong community support. e. Community Sentiment: Frustration over needing to collect signatures for a hearing overwhelmingly desired by the public; concern over adversarial dynamics with the Commission. f. Expressed hope for better cooperation with the Commission in future. g. District Councilors signaled readiness to continue independent action if necessary. ii. Discussion on 2026, 020th District Strategic Plan a. Strategic Focus: Priority Crime Areas i. Burglaries: Remaining a focus due to area accessibility, though numbers are trending down. ii. Robberies: Replacing theft from autos in strategic priority, given the increase in dangerous robberies (defined as crimes involving direct interaction with victims). iii. Gang Crime & Shootings: Tracked as a distinct area due to escalation and patterns of violence, mainly internal gang activity. b. Priority Area Boundaries: i. Burglaries: District-wide focus. ii. Shootings: Specifically mapped to streets—Marine/Magnolia (east/west), Foster/Lawrence (north/south). iii. Robberies: Primarily between Lorain and Broadway, Hollywood to Foster (north side). c. Crime Data and Trends i. Decrease observed in theft from auto, but not yet eradicated. ii. Robberies and burglaries sporadically spiking; crime patterns identified as often being the work of a small group or individual repeat offenders.	

- d. CTA Crime: Concerns raised and response detailed:
 - i. District police task force, occasional assignments for uniformed and plainclothes officers.
 - ii. Partnerships with CTA (cameras, dogs, private security), communication with public transport, and canine assistance from traffic police.
 - iii. Acknowledged ongoing need to be vigilant, especially at night and at specific stops.
- e. Policing Strategies and Tactics
 - i. Pattern-driven response: Focused on data—timing, location; resource allocation based on severity and recurrence.
 - ii. Tactics: Use of both uniformed presence and covert officers, coordination with detectives, and, when needed, collaboration with other districts, overtime utilization sparingly.
 - iii. Robbery/Shooting Investigation: Emphasis on early engagement, pattern analysis, and use of overtime for high-profile cases; referencing recent improvements in detective response (inspired by the "first 48" approach).
 - 1. Notably, “most crime” committed by a small number of repeat offenders; surgical, targeted intervention preferred over broad-stroke policing.
- f. Community Questions & Officer Responses
 - i. Trends in District: Recent incidents on west side (armed robberies, shootings, arson) highlighted; response includes analysis of time/location and flexible team deployment.
 - ii. Approach to CTA Crime: Confidence in CTA's increasing security measures and use of surveillance; prevention approaches favored.
 - iii. Violence Interrupters: Community raised the point about strategic coordination with violence interrupters to prevent shootings; previously, lack of "official contact" blocked their inclusion in the strategic plan. Ongoing exploration of formal partnerships.
- g. Transparency and Communication
 - i. Requests for more precise and timely information, especially on crime types, locations, and district's policing allocations.
 - ii. Suggestion: Improve communication about community meetings and strategic planning (e.g., clearer flyers specifying content/focus of sessions).
