Executive Summary

June 2026 District Council Monthly Report

District Councils met across the city in June, producing a citywide picture of public safety and policing discussions. Nineteen of twenty-two councils held official monthly meetings, while 3 councils (DC 004, DC 007, and DC 011) had their meetings cancelled. Of the nineteen councils that met, seventeen reported substantive top trends and concerns from their communities. Across all ten active CCPSA working groups, members continued to advance policy initiatives in coordination with CPD, ranging from community mediation to district strategic planning to alternative response.

Top Citywide Trends

Youth Safety, Gatherings & Teen Takeovers and Police Accountability, Trust, Staffing & Response were the two most cited concerns this month, each raised in 7 of 22 districts (31.8 percent). Mental Health Crisis Response and CARE Program Expansion, alongside Theft, including vehicle break-ins, airbag theft, and burglary, followed, each cited in 4 districts (18.2 percent). Gun Violence and Shootings and Traffic Safety were each raised in 3 districts (13.6 percent). CTA Safety and ICE/DHS Federal Enforcement Activity each appeared in 2 districts (9.1 percent).

Council Operations

Of the 22 District Councils, 19 held official meetings in June, with DC 004, DC 007, and DC 011 cancelled. DC 003, DC 012, and DC 025 each continue to carry one vacant council seat.

Recommendations to the Commission

Five of 22 districts submitted formal recommendations this month. CARE Program Expansion was the most repeated recommendation, submitted independently by DC 019, DC 020, and DC 025. DC 002 recommended continued advocacy for CARE Program expansion and support for the "Together with the Youth" proposal's placement on the CCPSA agenda. DC 003 submitted three recommendations: a more structured beat meeting follow-up process, resolution of its vacant third council seat, and improved CPD staffing and response capacity in the district.

Working Group Updates

CCPSA's ten active working groups reported continued progress in June, spanning district strategic planning, COPA mediation, community policing, alternative response, and Commission governance. Full updates for each working group are provided in this report.

Purpose, Process, and Background

The purpose of the DC monthly report is to ensure the Commission receives community input from residents of all twenty-two districts. The findings contained within are a reflection of the issues raised by Chicagoans who engaged with District Councils in the last month and do not come from a statistical sample of all Chicagoans.

With the production of this report, District Councils fulfill their purpose under the CCPSA Ordinance to ensure regular community input for efforts of the Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability, as outlined in Municipal Code of Chicago §2-80-070(a)(3). The report also caters to the responsibility of District Councils to report their findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Commission, as outlined in §2-80-070(e)(8). Additionally, the findings in this report provide District Councils with the means to identify opportunities for cross-district collaborations, including forming working groups to focus on specific issues raised by residents across the city.

The information contained in this report comes directly from the monthly public meetings of District Councils. By Ordinance, District Councils must hold monthly meetings to provide a forum for residents to raise and work to address concerns about policing. District Councils also use these meetings to share updates on their activities from the last month and to discuss and at times vote on recommendations for the Commission and other bodies of government. This report provides a summary of this information from the regular monthly meetings of each District Council. In cases where a District Council had to cancel a meeting, the Councilors provide findings based on any other outreach activities they conducted from the previous month. District Councils have an opportunity to review their individual updates before the finalization of this report. The notes in the individual updates do not represent the approved minutes of the meeting. District Councils approve meeting minutes at future dates in a manner consistent with the Illinois Open Meetings Act. This report represents a timely update to the Commission and other District Councils of findings, updates, and decisions at the meetings.

In compiling this report, CCPSA staff assess any notable trends from across the districts. The report may highlight recurring concerns and focuses raised by residents across the city. CCPSA staff may categorize findings to illustrate these trends. This exercise helps the Commission, the District Councils, CCPSA staff, and all other readers with key insights from the work of District Councils. Readers are encouraged to review the individual Council updates themselves as well to look for other potential recurring themes from community input gathered by District Councils.

This report also aids the District Councils in holding Quarterly Meetings. By CCPSA Ordinance, and as outlined under §2-80-070(e)(3), representatives from all twenty-two District Councils hold quarterly gatherings to identify trends and concerns from the previous quarter. Quarterly Meetings are organized by the DC Planning Team for Quarterly and Annual Meetings, a geographically diverse group of eight District Councilors chosen to represent general regions of the city. The Planning Team reviews these reports to determine the most significant trends and concerns raised by residents. District Councils discuss these key findings at their quarterly gatherings and work to identify potential solutions and strategies for addressing the concerns and trends identified.

While CCPSA endeavors to ensure this report is as thorough as possible, the data and information contained in the report are only a reflection of the input received and gathered by District Councils via community outreach and public meetings. This report is not a representative statistical sample of the concerns across each district. The Commission and any other readers of this report may consider other strategies and sources of information to gauge the needs and interests of Chicagoans. That said, this report serves an important function of showcasing what the District Councils learned in the past month and what the top concerns were of individuals who chose to interact with the District Council program.

District Councils act as the eyes and ears of their communities at a hyper-local level, providing critical insight that helps shape efforts to increase public safety and improve the future of policing in Chicago. The findings from this report help to ensure that public safety, policing, and police accountability policies and initiatives reflect the lived experiences of residents across the city.

PUSH NOTIFICATIONS

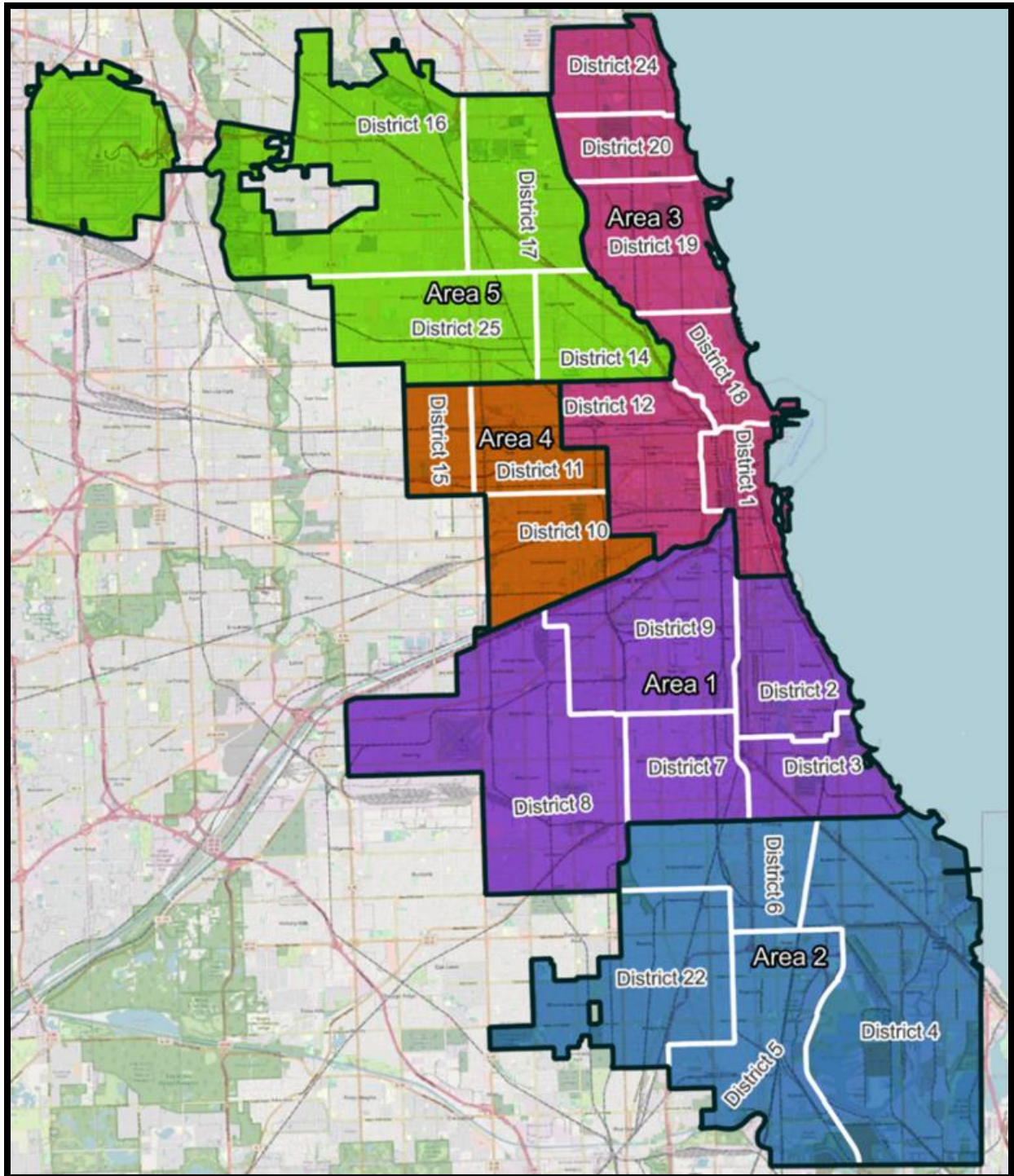
Purpose: This working group works to improve the effectiveness of CPD's District Strategic Plans by providing recommendations aligned with community needs.

i. Early Intervention System a. The Early Intervention System aims to better identify officers who show patterns of problematic behavior before serious incidents occur. While the City plans a basic system for 2027, the amendment calls for adding stronger data-based indicators and increasing community transparency about officers with repeated complaints or sustained violations. The goal is to reduce legal and financial risks and strengthen public trust. b. If the Council does not adopt the amendment, community members can force a vote with a petition of 2,000 signatures. The proposal needs 13 councilor votes to be heard and two-thirds approval for full Council action. Community support can come through contacting councilors, urging adoption, or helping gather petition signatures. ii. Property and Personal Safety Concerns a.
