Methodology

The data in this report came directly from District Council public monthly meetings held in March 2026. These meetings serve as a primary forum for community members to raise and address concerns about policing and public safety. At the recommendation of CCPSA staff, District Councils adjusted their agendas to include open, forum-style conversations focused on identifying trends and concerns in each district, as well as providing opportunities for councils to make recommendations to the Commission and vote on resolutions.

After each meeting, District Councils were provided with a draft summary of their respective monthly report for review and were invited to submit edits or additions to ensure accuracy and completeness. For District Councils that cancelled their March meeting, CCPSA staff conducted outreach to gather trends and concerns heard from constituents during the month, councilor reports on community engagements, and any recommendations for the Commission. This process fulfills the District Council responsibility outlined in §2-80-070(e)(3), which calls for District Councils to delegate members to attend quarterly meetings with representatives from each District Council to identify trends and concerns. By systematically collecting and organizing this information, the report will support the planning team responsible for these quarterly meetings, ensuring that conversations about trends and concerns reflect citywide patterns and priorities.

These steps also support the ordinance's requirement that District Councils report findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Commission (§2-80-070(e)(8)). The purpose of this process is to accomplish the responsibilities outlined in the Empowering Communities for Public Safety Ordinance and to ensure that community voices inform public safety policy and accountability efforts. The information gathered will be used to identify opportunities for collaboration among District Councils, inform and create new special projects, and encourage greater engagement with the Commission.

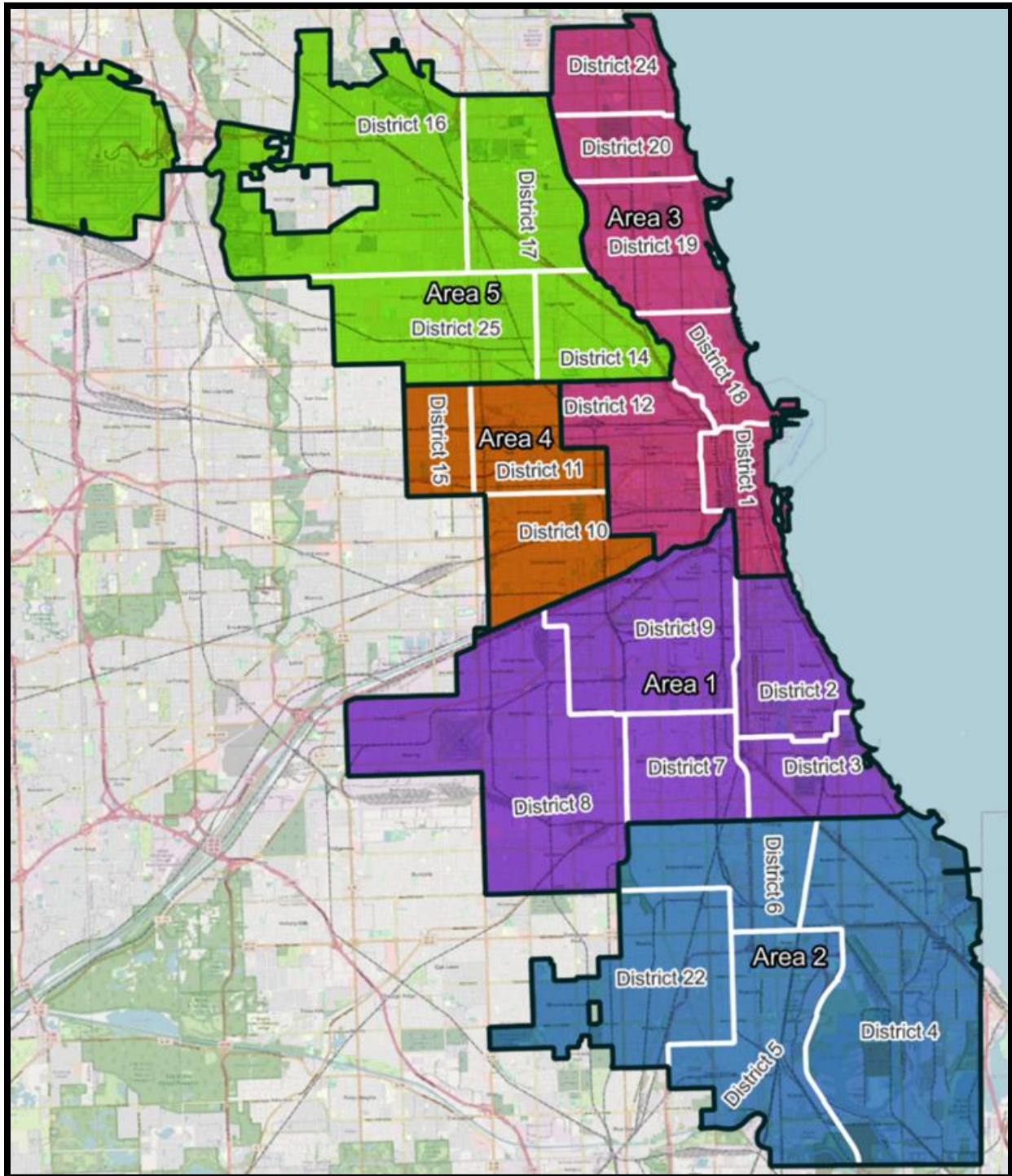

The public input gathered at each meeting is not only valuable, it is essential to ensuring that policies and initiatives reflect the lived experiences of residents. Safe Trip missions: Officers line platforms; on train arrival, they board, step through cars, and rotate stations hourly. iii. Anti-smoking missions: Three days/week across two shifts with K9 teams and Public Transportation Unit. iv. CPD Mass Transit Unit: Works exclusively on CTA rail/bus; most active teams citywide in/near 1st District. v. Sheriff partnership: Cook County Sheriff opened a Roosevelt satellite station; provided Ventra access and CTA camera feeds. b. Security infrastructure:	

- i. Investigations group: Retired CPD detectives; case-building with CTA Public Transportation Unit.
 - ii. Private security: Monterey Security (unarmed presence/reporting) and Action K9 (canine teams) used to augment.
 - iii. Cameras: 30,000+ across the system; access integrated with CPD's SDSC (Strategic Decision Support Center) upgraded via CTA support (18th Street Annex; staffed 24/7).
- c. Technology:
 - i. ZeroEyes (gun detection): AI-based detection of exposed firearms, with human review at a staffed operations center (former military/law enforcement analyzing alerts) before rapid notification to law enforcement. Expansion is underway; credited with ~20+ offender apprehensions and several robbery interventions.
- d. CTA rules & rider tools:
 - i. Concealed carry: Legal in IL with permit, but not on CTA.
 - ii. Emergency: Use the Passenger Intercom Unit (PIU) to contact the rail operator.
 - iii. Non-emergency: CTA chatbot can route quality-of-life concerns (not for emergencies).
- e. Homelessness & services:
 - i. Being homeless is not illegal; CTA partners with service providers (e.g., Haymarket presence at O'Hare) to engage and offer services.
 - ii. "Administrative bans" can be issued by CTA for certain behaviors, though enforcement tools are limited.
- f. Trends:
 - i. Crime reported as down in the 1st District and system-wide vs. prior year (approx. 5–8% reduction).
 - ii. Top enforcement categories: Fare evasion (#1), smoking/drinking (#2), frequently revealing outstanding arrest warrants during stops.
- g. Operational notes:
 - i. Undercover policing is limited given concealed carry risks; plainclothes officers often wear vests marked "Police."
 - ii. Bus issues addressed via targeted teams (e.g., Michigan Ave buses).

Top Trends & Concerns Discussed in Monthly Meeting

 - a. Community members reported experiencing racial tensions on 53rd St
 - b. Emphasized the need to address systemic issues in policing
- iii. **Large Youth Gatherings**
 - a. On 3/30, approximately 200 youth gathered in Hyde Park/Lake Park/53rd Street area
 - b. Majority peaceful but a smaller group caused property damage
 - c. Response included CPD, UCPD, violence interruption organizations, and private security
 - d. Area cleared by 9:44 PM
 - e. One arrest, no injuries reported
- iv. **Alternative Response**
 - a. Advocacy for CARE expansion to citywide, 24/7 coverage
- v. **Policing & Resource Strain**
 - a. Approximately 168 officers responded, with officers reassigned from neighboring districts
 - b. Discussion of reinstating school-based "activity zones" during high-risk periods
 - c. Emphasis on restorative approaches over punitive responses and improved cross-agency coordination
- vi. **Community Engagement & Socioeconomic Disparities**
 - a. Disparities between North and South Side communities including income differences (\$48k vs. \$137k average) and civic participation levels
 - b. Acknowledgment that engagement is often limited by time and economic constraints

 - i. CCPSA will hold a hearing, date TBD, on CPD collaboration with federal immigration agencies.
 - ii. District councilors submitted a joint letter urging inclusion of expert panels, structured questioning, and substantive responses from CPD leadership
- f. **COPA Update**
 - i. City Council passed ordinance granting COPA jurisdiction to investigate violations of the Welcoming City Ordinance—previously handled by CPD/BIA
 - ii. This aligns with one of the Council's prior recommendations
 - iii. However, community concerns remain about types of ICE-related interactions not covered by the Welcoming City Ordinance.
- g. **State's Attorney Protocols for Excessive Force by Federal Immigration Agents**
 - i. SAO released the Federal Immigration Enforcement Action Response Protocol (effective Feb 19).
 - ii. Councilors noted the protocol has not yet been used in known cases, such as the killing of Silverio Gonzalez.
 - iii. Multiple district councilors support the petition calling for a special prosecutor on these cases; hearing scheduled for March 24.
- h. **Cook County State's Attorney Office Initiatives**
 - i. Several new or expanded programs were reported:
 - 1. Juvenile Alternative to Detention Pilot – diversionary pre-trial program to keep youth out of detention
 - 2. Gun Accountability Program (GAP) – diversionary path for first-time weapons offenders to learn gun safety and avoid criminal records.
- i. **Upcoming June Meeting Planning**
 - i. Council intends to prioritize extended Q&A time with the State's Attorney's Office.
 - ii. Agreements reached:
 - 1. Meeting structure will shift to maximize SAO interaction.
 - 2. Council will prepare and send a draft agenda ~6 weeks in advance to meet SAO participation requirements.
 - 3. Potential for post meeting small group conversations.

This is why Bielecki, Parker, and Kennedy ran for this position. To properly represent the community. Bielecki mentioned that at February 17th meeting that some members of the nominating committee did not want to work towards that goal and work with the police. Tom McMahon DC 005 who was in attendance stated that there was a strong inference thereof. Bielecki stated that is in the first paragraph of District Council responsibility in the ordinance that was the role. Bielecki stated that many district council members choose not to follow that policy and work with organizations that create division. d. Bielecki challenged the integrity of the nominating process. i. Bielecki stated that he recused himself and resigned from the nominating committee after attempting to vet a commission member and verify the address. ii. Bielecki said that candidates who were qualified were ignored. iii. The nominating committee process needs to be better, fairer, not manipulated.	

e. For the Commission and Staff

- i. Once again as in 2024 there were members of the nominating committee who did not complete or review all the applications that were submitted.
 1. This also damages the integrity of the nomination process.
- ii. Councilor Bielecki provided Director Gross on February 20th with a verbal outline to improve the process. That nomination process would have nomination committee members to score the application for candidates who apply from the four geographic regions of the city that are already established. Together they would advocate for candidates from their region of the city. At combined meetings they would then propose and advocate for those candidates and come to a better consensus for names to be selected and submitted for consideration. It would require DC's on the nominating committee to work toward a better result that under the current process is lacking. Also a better vetting process is crucial. In 2024 a convicted sex offender was selected for an interview only to be rejected and turned away on the date of the interview. Another candidate with a criminal background was given an interview this year as well. This is a staff responsibility and must be addressed. Meeting attendance by nominating committee members needs to be addressed as well. Remote attendance guidelines are outlined and not followed. The reason for remote attendance must be stated and approved by a majority prior to any meeting.
